Pursuant to notice, a public hearing was held to discuss the proposed 2024 City of Antigo Budget.

Kaye Matucheski, Clerk-Treasurer/Finance Director, explained the budget documentation is included later in the packet. \$3,747,428.96 is the total levy with the new assessed value. The City's portion of the tax rate is \$9.82 which is a 1.6 cent increase from last year. A \$100,000 home will have a \$10.00 increase on the City's portion of the tax bill. Ms. Matucheski explained the City only has control over this portion of the mill rate tax levy and all of the other taxing

entities have to be added before there is a final tax bill. This rate meets all of the requirements set by the State.

Christian Radcliff of The Blessed Fig Tree at 800 Fifth Avenue, questioned some large changes in the budget. Ms. Matucheski explained the changes. She further explained the City's policy on fund balance requirements of keeping 25 - 30% of funds available. She told Mr. Radcliff he is welcome to contact her with any questions he may have when looking at the budget information.

There being no other individuals wishing to address this matter and after complying with statutory procedures, Alderperson Wagner moved, Alderperson Rebstock seconded, to close the public hearing at 6:18 p.m.

CONSENT AGENDA RESOLUTIONS

Resolution No. 104-23: Sewer Credit in the Amount of \$65.12 at 823 Western Avenue

WHEREAS, in October the utility bill for 823 Western Avenue had increased approximately one hundred dollars (\$100) and the owner contacted the Utility Clerk in regards to the increase; and,

WHEREAS, after discussions on potential causes of the increase, the owner discovered their garden sprinkler had been left on for two days; and,

WHEREAS, as this had happened earlier than the Utility was notified, there was nothing to check to see if the water went into the sewer system but it was determined the water from the sprinkler had soaked into the ground; and,

WHEREAS, the credit was calculated based on the average usage which results in a \$65.12 sewer credit.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo, to authorize a sewer credit in the amount of \$65.12 for 823 Western Avenue.

Resolution No. 105-23: Consideration of a 2024 Cost of Living Wage Increase Consisting of a 2% increase on the First Payroll in January, 2024 and a 1% increase in July, 2024 for Exempt Staff (including the City Attorney and Assistant City Attorney) and 2% on January 1, 2024 and 1% on July 1, 2024 for Non-exempt/Non-represented Employees

WHEREAS, Common Council reviews the proposed Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA) for all non-represented staff as part of the annual budget process; and,

WHEREAS, the Committee of the Whole, at their October 11, 2023 meeting, was presented with the final draft of the City's 2024 budget document including the associated budgetary impacts reflecting a wage increase for exempt staff (including the City Attorney & Assistant City Attorney) and full-time non-exempt/non-represented, year-round part-time, and seasonal employees.

WHEREAS, the 2024 COLA is to be distributed as a 2% increase on January 1, 2024 and a 1% increase July 1, 2024 for full-time non-exempt/non-represented, year-round part-time and seasonal employees with the same percentages distributed to exempt employees on the full payroll nearest these dates.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo, that a 2% cost-of-living increase for full-time non-exempt/non-represented, year-round part-time, and seasonal employees be effective on January 1, 2024 followed with a 1% increase on July 1, 2024.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, to authorize a 2% cost-of-living increase for the exempt staff (including the City Attorney & Assistant City Attorney) effective upon the first payroll of 2024 followed with a 1% increase for the payroll coinciding with July 1, 2024.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the funds needed to implement this cost-of-living increase be derived from each Department's respective fund/wage accounts.

Resolution No. 106-23: Establishment of a 2024 Budget (Attachment D) with Infrastructure Alternatives for the Operation & Maintenance of the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants

WHEREAS, the City of Antigo has an operational and maintenance agreement with Infrastructure Alternatives, Inc. (IAI) serving as the City's contractual managers for the Water and Wastewater Treatment facilities; and,

WHEREAS, in the past, the operation and maintenance budgets for the Water and Wastewater Treatment Plants are reviewed annually after the previous year's operational expenditures were known and the contract was amended accordingly; and,

WHEREAS starting with the 2024 budget document with IAI it was decided to assure that the budget review for the operational maintenance agreement would coincide with Council's review of the 2024 budget process in November by taking an annual projection based upon the last quarter of 2022 along with the first 3 quarters of 2023; and,

WHEREAS, IAI submitted their 2024 budget document and subsequently requested that the City implement the new costs as Attachment D in the contract with monthly payments adjusted as of January 1, 2024 with any necessary adjustments to be presented through the Committee/Council process after the 1st quarter of 2024.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo, that the proposed 2024 Water and Wastewater Treatment Plant budgets are hereby approved at an annual cost of \$664,117 for water and \$748,987 for wastewater and implemented into the existing agreement with Infrastructure Alternatives, Inc. as Attachment D with funding to be derived from the Water and Wastewater Operating Budgets.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the Clerk-Treasurer/Finance Director is authorized to complete the necessary budget adjustments.

Resolution No. 107-23: Amend Tax Incremental Finance District (TID) 6 Project Plan to Allocate Excess Tax Increment to TID 5

WHEREAS, pursuant to Sec. 66.1105, Wisconsin Statutes, the Plan Commission of the City of Antigo has held a public hearing on the proposed Project Plan Amendment for Tax Incremental Finance District No. 6 (herein "Project Plan" and "District") on November 7, 2023; and,

WHEREAS, prior to publication of notice of said hearing, a copy of the notice was sent by first class mail to the chief executive officer or administrator (or their designee) of all local governmental entities having the power to levy taxes on property within the District including Antigo School District, Northcentral Technical College, Langlade County, and Antigo Inland Lake Protection & Rehabilitation District; and,

WHEREAS, the purpose of this Project Plan Amendment is to allocate excess tax increments from TID No. 6 (the donor TID) to TID No. 5 (the recipient TID); and,

WHEREAS, the amended Project Plan meets all of the following requirements of Sec. 66.1105, Wisconsin Statutes; and,

WHEREAS, the City Council makes the following findings:

- a. The boundaries of TID No. 6 are not changing and donor and recipient TID have the same overlying taxing jurisdictions; and,
- b. That the allocation of excess tax increment from the District is likely to enhance significantly the value of real property in TID No. 5 and the retirement of debt obligations of TID No. 5; and,
- c. The amended Project Plan is feasible and in conformity with the City's comprehensive plan; and,
- d. The amount of area devoted to retail business at the end of the expenditure period was less than 35%; and,
- e. That TID No. 5 was created in 2001 as a "rehabilitation and conservation" TID; therefore the District qualifies as being a recipient TID pursuant to State Statute 66.1105(6)(f)2.b; and,
- f. The Project Plan demonstrates that TID No. 6 has sufficient revenue to pay for all incurred project costs and has sufficient surplus revenue to pay some of the costs for TID No. 5 project expenses; and,
- g. The estimated amount that will be allocated to TID No. 5 is \$790,000.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the City Council of the City of Antigo, Wisconsin hereby approves and adopts the amended Project Plan for the Tax Incremental Finance District No. 6.

Dave Rasmussen, MSA Professional Services, addressed Council via zoom and explained the amendment and why it is being proposed. Both TIDs are proposed to close in 2025. The closures of the TIDs will free up about \$13.6 million in value to be added to the tax roll. He stated he is recommending, before closure of the TIDs, the City do an affordable housing extension to allow use of affordable housing improvements of about \$224,000 in TID 6 and \$103,000 in TID 5.

Resolution No. 109-23: Approve 2024 Health Insurance Renewal for Coverage and Administration with Aspirus Health Plan and Stop Loss Coverage with Stop Loss Partners and Clarify Coverage Updates

WHEREAS, the City of Antigo's Health Insurance is a Self-Funded Plan which means the City sets the premium for the upcoming year based on the recommendations from the actuaries of the third-party administrator, fund balance, and the claims experience; and,

WHEREAS, the City's third-party administrator is Aspirus Health Plan and Stop Loss Partners is the new stop loss carrier which has a \$60,000 level of stop loss including prescriptions; and,

WHEREAS, Aspirus Health Plan has handled the City's health insurance very effectively and has provided tremendous customer support in addition to large discounts on the medical claims; and,

WHEREAS, Stop Loss Partners is the new stop loss carrier for the City and has quoted the renewal with an overall increase of 9.5% which is consistent with the claims experience for the City; and,

WHEREAS, the stop loss laser for two employees that was applicable for 2023 have been removed for 2024 but there is one employee that has a new laser which results in additional costs to the City and this has been reflected in the rates.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo, to approve the 2024 Health Insurance Premium Rates as follows:

Resolution No. 110-23: 2024 Dental Insurance Renewal with Delta Dental

WHEREAS, the City of Antigo's Dental Insurance is a Self-Funded Plan which means the City sets the premium for the upcoming year based on the recommendations from the actuaries of the third-party administrator and the claims experience; and,

WHEREAS, the premiums have been recommended to stay the same for 2024 as 2023; and,

WHEREAS, Delta Dental is the third-party administrator and the City contracts directly with the local agent, Bremax Insurance, and the rates for the administration fee are staying the same at \$5.65 per member per month and are included in the premiums.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo to retain Delta Dental as the third-party administrator and set the 2024 Dental Insurance Premium per employee per month, including the \$5.65 administrative fee, as follows:

Resolution No. 111-23: Agreement with Northwind Solar for the Construction of a 350 Kilowatt Ground-mounted Solar Array Project with a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) at the Wastewater Treatment Plant

WHEREAS, Common Council awarded the 350 Kilowatt ground-mounted solar array project with a battery energy storage system at the City's Wastewater Treatment Plant to Northwind Solar at their October 2023 meeting; and,

WHEREAS, a construction agreement between Northwind Solar and the City, known as an Energy Procurement Contract (EPC), was not available at the time of the bid and was subsequently submitted by Northwind Solar; and,

WHEREAS, in order to accommodate a construction schedule that will allow such work as the roadway "boring" of electrical connectivity lines and placement of the ground-mounted solar array frames during the fall/winter of 2023/24 an expedited review of the agreement is warranted; and,

WHEREAS, staff and the City Attorney provided Northwind Solar with a summary of proposed contract language revisions with the desire to mitigate them prior to the November 8th Special Finance, Personnel & Legislative Committee to be held prior to the regularly scheduled November Council meeting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo, to approve the execution of the EPC agreement with Northwind Solar should the necessary revisions be properly mitigated by the November 8, 2023 Council meeting.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, to allow the Mayor and the Clerk-Treasurer/Finance Director to endorse the final agreement, subject to the City Attorney's final review, without returning to the Committee/Council process should further revisions remain to be mitigated at the time of the regularly scheduled November 8, 2023 Council meeting.

Resolution No. 112-23: Recommendation from Weather Siren Ad Hoc Committee to apply for a Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Federal Program Grant

WHEREAS, the Weather Siren Ad Hoc Committee met on October 31, 2023 and advanced a recommendation that a grant application be submitted under the State of Wisconsin Department of Military Affairs Division of Emergency Management through the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) Program by the November 29, 2023 application deadline; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Antigo does not qualify under the grant programs 90%/10% grant to local match ratio for economically distressed rural communities with populations of 3,000 or under; and,

WHEREAS, the City of Antigo would qualify under the 75%/25% grant to local match ratio should the installation of weather warning sirens meet the grant criteria and state levels of completion for the funding; and,

WHEREAS, a projected budget of \$225,000 (\$168,750 grant & \$56,250 local match) to cover project development, construction and administration is projected to meet the needs for a city-wide warning system; and,

WHEREAS, the grant application allows for up to 36 months for completion of the project, if so awarded, providing the necessary time for matching funds to be established.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, BY THE COMMON COUNCIL, City of Antigo, to approve the advancement of a Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Building Resilient Infrastructure and Communities (BRIC) grant application in the projected total project amount of \$225,000.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that matching funds will need to be sought through the 2025 and/or the 2026 City budgetary process (or by other means) should the grant application be so approved.

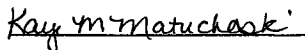
